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About the Book:

Reading comprehension is the process of contracting meaning from text. The goal of all reading instruction is ultimately targeted at helping a reading comprehend text. Reading comprehension involves at least two people: the reader and the writer. The process of comprehending involves decoding the writer's words and then using background knowledge to construct an approximate understanding of the writer's message.

While word identification is a process that results in a fairly exact outcome (i.e., a student either reads the word "autom. "le" or not) the process of comprehending text is not so exact. Different readers will interpret in action's message in different ways. Comprehension is affected by the reader's knowledge of the opic, knowledge of language structures, knowledge of text structures and genres in the ledge of cognitive and metacognitive strategies, their reasoning abilities, their too, out, in, and their level of engagement.

Reading imprehension is also affected by the quality of the reading material. Some writers are been writers than others, and some writers produce more complex reading material than others. Text that is well organized and clear is called "considerate text," and text that is poorly organized and difficult to understand can be called "inconsiderate text." The more inconsiderate the text, the more work will be required of a reader to comprehend the text. Readers who do not have the background, abilities, or motivation to overcome the barriers presented in inconsiderate text will have more difficulty comprehending these types of texts.

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
